Services Program (2), Ronald E McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program, and Minority Male Initiative) and is currently Co-Principal Investigator on three grants. He has experience developing data-driven comprehensive academic support programs aimed at serving first-generation, low-income, and under-represented college students and minority males at institutions of higher education.

Upon his arrival at Texas State University (2011), Dr. Nava assisted in the implementation of the Personalized Academic and Career Exploration (PACE) Center and he has had responsibilities in overseeing the PACE Mentoring and Academic Coaching (MAC) Program, PACE Academic Advising Center, Texas Success Initiative Program, Pathway Program, Title V and Title III grant student services, Minority Male Initiative, and assessment for the PACE Center.
